Offering an education to children who would greatly benefit from all that Oundle has to offer but who are unable to take advantage because of financial circumstance, has long been a steadfast commitment of the School. Oundle is founded on philanthropy and we profoundly value the ethos of giving, whether it be educating pupils in the importance of contributing to the wider society of which they are part or, more fundamentally, enabling access to such an education.

As we continue to move forward as a School, the Governing Body remains committed to increasing bursary provision significantly. Indeed, in 2018 the School pledged to remove fee remission from scholarships in order to increase the bursary fund and we are now proud to offer a programme of financial aid based wholly on careful means-testing.

Since 2013, The Foundation has raised over £3.5m in support of our bursary endeavours and, on behalf of the hundreds of children who have benefited, we would like to offer our

heartfelt thanks to all Old Oundelians (OOs), parents and supporters who have made this possible. It is a privilege to bring these pupil stories to life within these pages and to highlight the richness that they in turn have brought to Oundle.

Our Way Of Working

The Foundation funds two programmes: the General Bursary Scheme, which offers between 10% and 100% fee remission both on application and in response to drastic changes in circumstances, and the Life-Changing Bursary Scheme (LCBS), which seeks to provide opportunities for children from disadvantaged backgrounds who are identified as being particularly likely to benefit from a boarding education.

The LCBS is operated in partnership with other charities which help to identify suitable candidates and offer pastoral support outside of term time. This not only optimises those children's chances of success but also their potential positive impact on their community and peers.

Our well-established partnership with Springboard (now the Royal National Children's Springboard Foundation or Royal

Springboard) has been appraised by them over the past three years and assessed as having a "very positive" impact. We continue to work with the Eastside Young Leaders' Academy in addition to developing newer partnerships with the Ormiston Academies Trust and Lord Agnew's Boarding Schools Partnership, which seeks to provide boarding opportunities for children in foster care. Oundle is well-equipped to support such children thanks to an increased focus on mental and emotional well-being for all pupils over the past few years and dedicated staff in our Health Centre.

Demand continues to outstrip funds and competition for bursaries is strong. In order to treat fairly all applications received throughout the year, we assess all awards on their merits irrespective of how far in advance of the deadline they are received.

2017 - 2018 Bursary Highlights

- 16 bursary award holders (10 boarders and 6 day pupils), completed their Oundle education
- 10 of these received 100% fee remission:7 on application and 3 in response toa change in circumstances
- 60% of grades achieved were A*- B; 22% were A*/A



The Life-Changing Bursary Scheme – Pupil Stories

Unless otherwise indicated, all excerpts are from individual pupils' School reports, written by either their Tutor or Housemaster/Housemistress. Minor amendments have been made to protect pupils' identity where appropriate.

Pupil A 66 ... We will all be sad to see pupil A leave as she has left a legacy of gentle unassuming presence which, although not always headline news, is very important to the smooth running of a House. She has worked hard and achieved success despite having health challenges in recent years.

Pupil A has been a delight to tutor over the years. From her entry into the School, she has impressed me with her determination and focus. Meeting the demands of our regular tests and exams was a significant challenge, but one to which she rose as she has risen successively over her senior School career, growing in personal confidence along the way. Modest and often self-effacing, she has learned to respect herself and to give herself credit for achieving so much, often against the odds as in her Sixth Form years which from Easter 2017 have been dogged by illness. Her performance in her AS Maths last summer was a testimony to her attitude and determination as well as to her ability.

After her strong GCSE performance, she moved with confidence into her chosen programme, always with the

vocational focus of Veterinary Medicine before her, and from this goal and aspiration she has never wavered. Her work experience in this field has been varied and thoroughly impressive, as have been the testimonies returned. She shows initiative and resolve in this as in all areas. Learning to speak out, to question and to present in public have been hurdles for her but she has grown in confidence from the early days of English Orals, through accomplishments in Spanish and into the presentation of her own research in her EPQ. That she has matured and is successful in this respect is evidenced by her successful interviews for university places.

Kind and thoughtful, pupil A has always been a considerate member of the House and an excellent role model and mentor for the younger ones. Her gaining of a British Sign Language qualification is a mark of the social concern which she evidences in so many ways not least through her daily interactions with fellow students and her teachers. Without exception her teachers have enjoyed working with her, appreciate her efforts and her progress, commend the integrity of her present study and wish her well for the future.

Pupil A achieved the equivalent of BBB at A level and gained a university place to read Veterinary Medicine.

Pupil B 66 ... I will be sorry to be finally saying goodbye to pupil B at the end of this term. He has made a great success of his time at Oundle. I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know him. When I compare the tall, dapper, confident young man who is leaving us with the quiet and rather reserved young boy who joined us, I realise how much he has developed during his time here. He has always retained a fiercely independent work ethic and has set himself high standards. This trait has remained very much a feature of his Sixth Form years. He has also shown himself to be a gifted all-rounder; a key member of the golf team, a key singer in our House Part Song ensemble, a fine footballer (and key member of Paddock), an excellent cricketer, and all this alongside an academic profile that has seen him obtain some stellar GCSE results, an Academic Exhibition and a serious attempt at Oxbridge. Despite the latter not working out, he does still have very good offers and so is very well placed for the next stage in his education.

He has always been a low maintenance tutee and has never caused any problems. I don't think I have had a single email from another member of staff about misbehaviour, lateness or any other misdemeanour. He has performed well on the sports field, excelling at cricket, football and golf, all sports that I hope he will continue throughout university and beyond. Perhaps one day he will pop back to have a round of golf with me. His crowning glory at School may well have been his role in the House Part Song win and the subsequent performance at the Birmingham Symphony Hall in front of nearly 3,000 people – something not many people can put on their CV.

He has always been a good example to lower years, excellent company at the dinner table and a good conversationalist during a duty night. It was a real shame that he didn't get a place at Oxbridge but he will excel wherever he ends up, and will continue to be a credit to the School, his mother and to himself. 99

She is a delightful girl with a big heart and I am utterly impressed by her grit and determination to succeed. She has responded to all the advice, support and often uncomfortable recommendations we have given her with grace and poise. Whenever she faces a setback, she acknowledges it, then moves up and on. I have every admiration for her. She thoroughly deserves to do well in her exams and I truly hope she gets the results and the university place she deserves. It has been an utter pleasure. 9

I very much hope that his hard work is rewarded with the high final grades I know he is looking to achieve, but whatever grades he gets he will know he tried his best and he cannot ask more of himself than that.

For him, however, School has always been about more than just academic work, and I imagine he has learned as much outside of the classroom as he has from lessons, and certainly a knowledge that will stay with him much longer. He is about to enter a wider and more demanding world. I am confident – truly confident – that his time at Oundle has prepared him to face that world with courage and character and that, whatever he decides to do, he is going to make a success of life. Pupil F was awarded an entry bursary and achieved AAB in her A levels. She will take up a place at a Russell Group university to read Biological Sciences.
