The following poem is by the First World War poet Wilfred Owen (1893-1918). Read the poem carefully and answer the questions that follow.

### *The Send-Off*

Down the close darkening lanes they sang their way  
To the siding-shed,  
And lined the train with faces grimly gay.

Their breasts were stuck all white with wreath and spray  
As men's are, dead. 5

Dull porters watched them, and a casual tramp  
Stood staring hard,  
Sorry to miss them from the upland camp.

Then, unmoved, signals nodded, and a lamp 10  
Winked to the guard.

So secretly, like wrongs hushed-up, they went.  
They were not ours:  
We never heard to which front these were sent; 15

Nor there if they yet mock what women meant  
Who gave them flowers.

Shall they return to beatings of great bells  
In wild train-loads?  
A few, a few, too few for drums and yells, 20

May creep back, silent, to village wells,  
Up half-known roads.

1. Sum up what this poem is about in just one sentence.  
(1 mark)
2. Look again at lines 4-5. What do these lines mean and how effectively do you think they make their point?  
(4 marks)
3. Find an example of an oxymoron in the poem and explain its meaning.  
(2 marks)
4. Look again at lines 11-13. What do these lines suggest about the speaker's attitude to the war?  
(4 marks)
5. What do you think the last two lines of the poem suggest about the impact of war on the soldiers who return home?  
(4 marks)
6. What is your opinion of this poem? Support your answer with quotations from the text. In your answer you might like to comment on:
  - the effectiveness of comparisons, such as metaphors and similes
  - the sound of the words in the poem and the way they are grouped together
  - the form and structure of the poem.
