## **Section A: Comprehension**

## You should spend 30 minutes on this section

The following poem is by the poet Douglas Dunn (born 1942). Read the poem carefully and answer the questions that follow. You should support your answers with quotations from the poem, as appropriate. Leave yourself enough time to answer the last question in full detail.

#### Ships

When a ship passes at night on the Clyde The swans in the reeds picking the oil from their feathers Look up at the lights, the noise of new waves, Against hill-climbing houses, malefic\* cranes.

A fine rain attaches itself to the ship like skin.

The lascars\* play poker, the Scottish mate looks
At the last lights, that one is Ayrshire,
Others on lonely rocks, or clubfooted peninsulas.

They leave restless boys without work in the rivertowns.

In their houses are fading pictures of fathers ringed

Among ships' complements in wartime, model destroyers,

Souvenirs from uncles deep in distant engine rooms.

Then the boys go out, down streets that look on water.

They say, 'I could have gone with them',

A thousand times to themselves in the glass cafés,

Over their American soft drinks, into their empty hands.

1. What impression of the ship yard and surrounding area is created in stanza one?
(3 marks)

2. Comment on any words or phrases in stanza two which continue the impression created in stanza one.

- 3. What point is the poet making when he says that the pictures are 'fading' (line 10) and that the souvenirs are 'from uncles deep in distant engine rooms' (line 12)?

- 4. Is the unusual phrase 'glass cafés' (line 15) merely descriptive, or is the poet trying to suggest something more here?

5. In what way might the phrase 'empty hands' (line 16) be said to sum up the boys' situation?

- 6. What is your opinion of this poem? As well as writing about the meaning of the poem, in your answer you might like to comment on:
  - the effectiveness of comparisons, such as metaphors and similes;
  - the sound of the words in the poem and the way they are grouped together;
  - the form and structure of the poem.
